Update on MassIPL Environmental Stewardship Assessment

Epiphany is working with Mass Interfaith Power and Light (MassIPL) to conduct an Environmental Assessment of the Church property and the rectory. This will help identify opportunities to save energy and reduce our carbon footprint, and will feed into an overall Plan being developed by the Property Committee. It will also serve as the basis for a Roadmap to Zero Carbon for the Parish. MassIPL recently completed a similar Assessment for the Winchester Unitarian Church (attached). It is an extensive and detailed document identifying both immediate and long-term opportunities to reduce energy consumption and emissions.

The Creation Care Group and Epiphany Property Committee have formed a Working Group to provide preliminary data on utility usage and energy requirements which are required before conducting the MassIPL onsite visit. The Working Group will meet in mid-December to review the data when completed and submit to MassIPL.

Summary of the Glasgow UN Climate Summit (COP26)

At the Glasgow COP26 Climate Summit in November, leaders from nations throughout the world met to discuss initiatives for fighting climate change. The Creation Care group discussed the results in our November meeting. Although resolutions were passed to limit methane emissions and reduce deforesting, many observers believe the resolutions were insufficient to prevent the 1.5 degree increase global temperatures. The funding that richer nations committed to provide to poorer nations is substantially less than the amount requested, and a crucial resolution to "phase out" coal production was watered down to less powerful statement. The Creation Care team followed up this assessment with a discussion of related issues such as advocating for non-fossil fuel investments and the need for enhancements to the power grid.

The results of the Glasgow Summit will be discussed in more detail in the Nov/Dec Creation Care Newsletter.

Recycling update

Currently Pam Chester, Ellen Rockefeller or other Creation Care members are volunteering to take home food waste for composting. We discussed funding a weekly service to pick up and compost Epiphany food waste. Suzie Almquist agreed to research composting services with which Epiphany can contract.

Planning a Creation Care retreat in January

The Creation Care Ministry will conduct a strategic planning retreat to discuss our Mission, Strategies and Tactics for 2022. This will be a 2-3 hour meeting conducted on a Saturday or Sunday.
